American Sign Language (ASL)

During the mid 19th century the United States Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet went to Europe to observe and learn the methods used for teaching in European schools for the Deaf. In a Paris school Gallaudet met Laurent Clerc who was using a one-handed manual alphabet and signs for words with Deaf children. From this French method he, on August 15, 1817, opened the first school for the Deaf in the nation and Clerc as the head teacher. These various forms of signs, combined with French Sign Language, later became known as American Sign Language.

American Sign Language is a visual-gestural language with its own vocabulary and syntax. When signing ASL you do not sign every word, just the main ideas and concepts. When you sing songs with sign you are using Contact Sign Language, which is American Sign Language vocabulary and concepts in a spoken English word order. There are other sign language systems including Signed Exact English (SEE SIGN) which signs every word in the exact English word order. The following is a sentence to show how SEE SIGN, Contact Sign Language, and ASL would sign it:




